Time for Reflection

May: A Month of Presence, Faithfulness, and Quiet Strength

Traditionally, the month of May has been dedicated to Mary, the mother of Jesus—a time when the Church pauses to honour her quiet “yes,” her steadfast presence, and her deep trust in God. For many, it was once a familiar rhythm: gathering as families to pray the rosary, placing flowers before a statue of Mary, and entrusting the ordinary and the burdensome parts of life to her care.

While some of these practices have faded, the invitation of May remains. It is a time to rediscover Mary not only as a figure of devotion, but as a model of discipleship—one who listened, pondered, accompanied, and remained.

May is also the month in which we celebrate Mother’s Day, giving thanks for mothers and for all those who embody a “mothering” presence in our lives. This draws us naturally to reflect on the women who surrounded Jesus during his ministry.

The Gospels remind us that women were not on the margins of Jesus’ mission, but at its heart. Matthew tells us that “many women were there, looking on from a distance; they had followed Jesus from Galilee and had provided for him.” Among them were Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Joseph, and the mother of the sons of Zebedee (Matthew 27:55–56).

Luke offers an even fuller picture. He names Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Susanna, and “many others” who travelled with Jesus and supported his ministry out of their own resources (Luke 8:1–3).

These women were not passive observers.

They were disciples, companions, and benefactors—women of courage who stepped beyond social expectations to follow the call they had encountered.

They remained when others fled. They witnessed the cross. They became the first bearers of the Resurrection.

In them, we glimpse something essential about the nature of discipleship: it is not defined by status or recognition, but by fidelity, generosity, and love.

Today, women continue to be deeply present in the life of the Church—in liturgy, pastoral care, administration, and the quiet, often unseen work that sustains community. Their contribution is not an addition to the Church's life; it is integral to it.

At the same time, the Church continues to reflect on how the full dignity of all the baptised is expressed in its structures and decision-making. This is not simply a question of roles, but of listening—of recognising where the Spirit is already at work, often in voices that have not always been fully heard. May invites us into that listening.

In Mary, and in the women of the Gospel, we encounter a Church that is attentive, courageous, and responsive. A Church that walks with others. A Church that trusts that God works powerfully through what the world may overlook.

Perhaps the invitation during the month of May is simply: to notice, to honour, and to give thanks for the quiet strength, faithfulness, and love that continue to shape the life of our community.

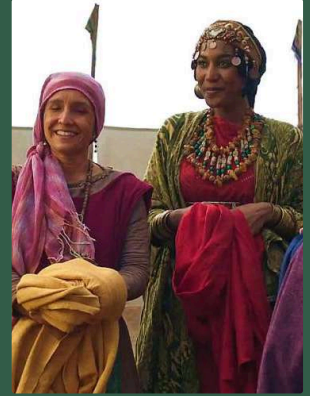

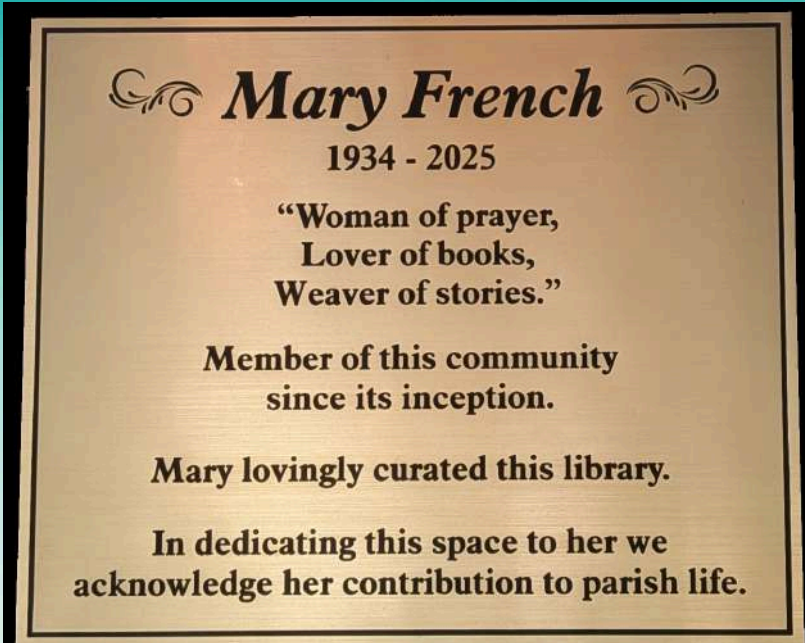

On Friday 29 May, our parish library was officially named the Mary French Library. What follows is an excerpt from Elaine Laycock's tribute to Mary: "When Mary died in August 2025, we lost a cherished member of our community. In dedicating our parish library to Mary's memory, we recognise and honour her commitment to maintaining and enriching the library.

A foundation parishioner, Mary was involved in every aspect of parish life – from liturgical ministries and pastoral care to social gatherings and the many quiet tasks carried out behind the scenes. Her gentle faith, kindness, and tireless service inspired those around her and strengthened the bonds of our parish family. Her life and service left an enduring mark on the identity and spirit of our parish. Mary French was a woman of deep faith and a gifted teller of stories."



‘WOMAN OF THE SACRED HEART’

From ‘Lady’ to ‘Woman’: A spirituality of Mary of Nazareth

I did not grow up with any great devotion to Mary... the theology or spirituality (I would not have used those words then!) surrounding Mary did not attract me at all. I found it all quite dark. I was in my 30s, now an MSC brother studying theology, when I decided I needed to find a way of understanding Mary that made some sense to me, particularly in the light of all I had been learning in my studies of scripture and theology. I began by talking to friends and confreres who I knew had a special love of Mary.... It was these responses that began the journey of exploration which led to this song: ‘Woman of the Sacred Heart’.

***In your flesh, he had to come.
You grounded him upon our earth.
Your feet that walked, your womb that held,
your pain that brought this love to birth.
The Sacred Heart of him you held
can grieve and grow within the space,
of patient love, and listening;
a mother’s choice, a mystic’s grace.***

***In your delight, in your despair,
the smallest choices of each day;
the cost to you, your hope-filled yes,
your courage lived, shows us the way.
Our Lady of the Sacred Heart,
eternal sign of God’s surprise,
in you we know the poor as blessed,
this world transformed before our eyes.***

***O Woman of the Sacred Heart,
you heard the words of Gabriel.
Pray we may hear the call of God
and come to meet Emmanuel.
His truth is witnessed in your face,
that he became and was, and is
the Sacred Heart, the resting place;
our hearts forever held in his.***

Since it was published in 1998, I’ve been quite staggered by the response to the song...Often they will say that the song has articulated something genuinely new for them in terms of a spirituality of Mary.

I think it was St Bernard of Clairvaux (1090 - 1153) who first called Mary, ‘Our Lady’. As devotion to ‘Our Lady’ evolved over the centuries, she became (in some ways) more and more removed from our human experience, more and more hidden inside the statues and the shrines, and behind layers of piety and confusing theology. Since Vatican II, the Mary of the scriptures has been coming back... The woman of earth has stepped out from behind the lady on the clouds!

Welcome back, Mary of Nazareth!

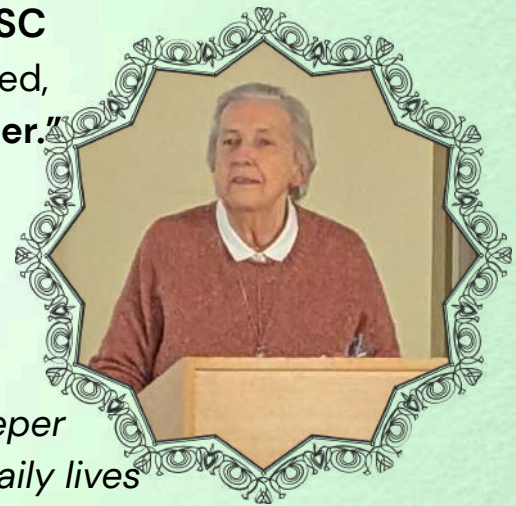

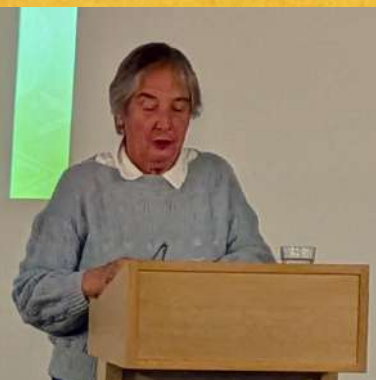
Sr. Dain Inglis FDNCS presented a talk titled, "Our Lady of the Sacred Heart – to know her is to love her."

But Jesus would not leave us orphaned.

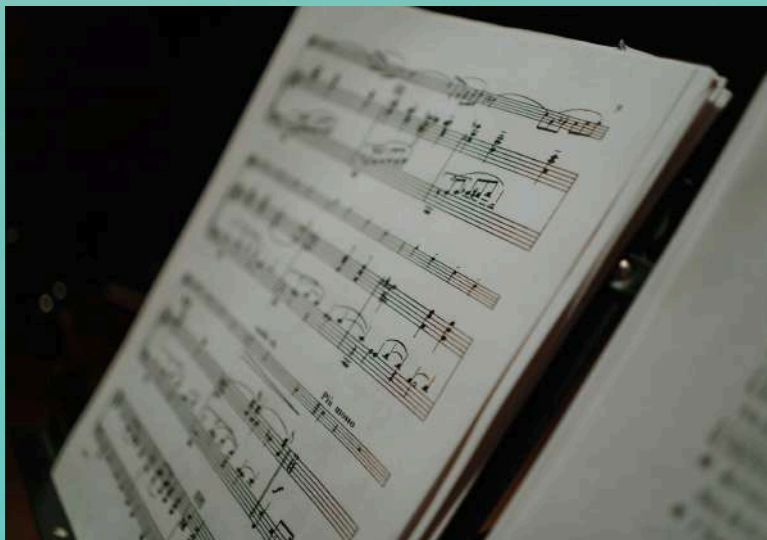

you also will live.*

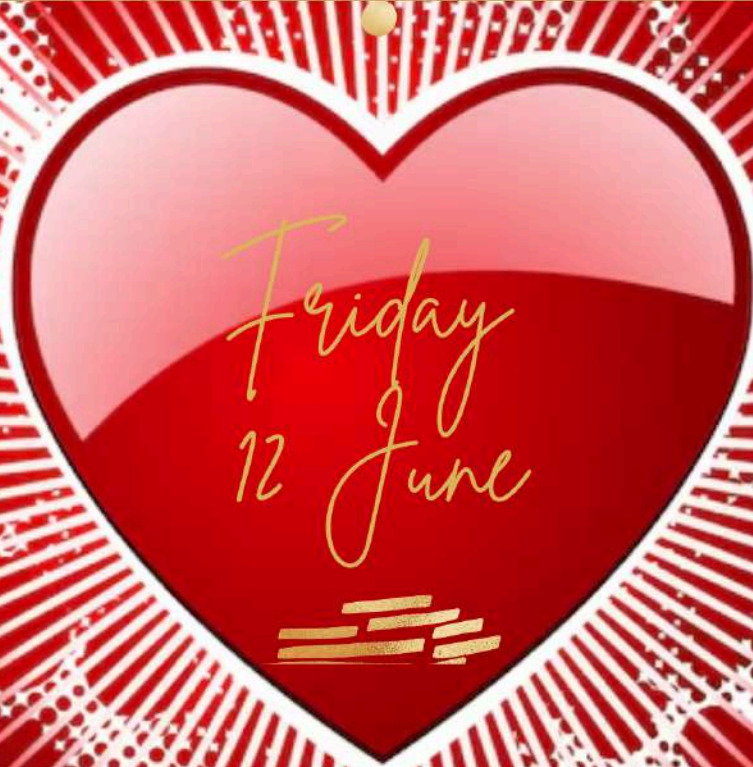

Receiving Forgiveness

Each year, from 27 May to 3 June, Australia observes National Reconciliation Week, a time to reflect on our shared history and the ongoing journey toward healing. Within this week, National Sorry Day (26 May) holds particular significance, commemorating the Stolen Generations—Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children who were forcibly removed from their families. These observances invite not only national reflection, but also a deeply personal one: the role of apology and forgiveness in our own mental and emotional well-being.

Saying sorry and seeking reconciliation are not simply moral or social acts—they are powerful psychological tools. When we carry guilt, shame, or unresolved conflict, it can weigh heavily on our mental health, often leading to stress, anxiety, and emotional fatigue. A sincere apology can begin to lift that burden. By acknowledging harm and taking responsibility, we release the inner tension that comes from avoidance or denial. In this way, apologising becomes a form of emotional honesty that restores a sense of integrity and self-respect.

Psychologically, the act of saying sorry fosters empathy. It asks us to step outside ourselves and consider the experience of another, strengthening our emotional intelligence and deepening our capacity for connection. For an apology to truly heal, it needs three essential elements: regret (expressing genuine sorrow), responsibility (owning the impact of our actions), and remedy (a commitment to change or repair). When these are present, an apology can rebuild trust and open the door to reconciliation.

Equally transformative is the experience of forgiveness. To receive forgiveness can feel like being set free—from the weight of past mistakes and the fear of being defined by them. And to offer forgiveness, when we are ready, can release us from bitterness and resentment, creating space for peace and emotional healing.

In both giving and receiving, forgiveness is not about forgetting or excusing harm. Rather, it is about choosing a path that restores dignity, nurtures wellbeing, and allows both individuals and communities to move forward with hope.

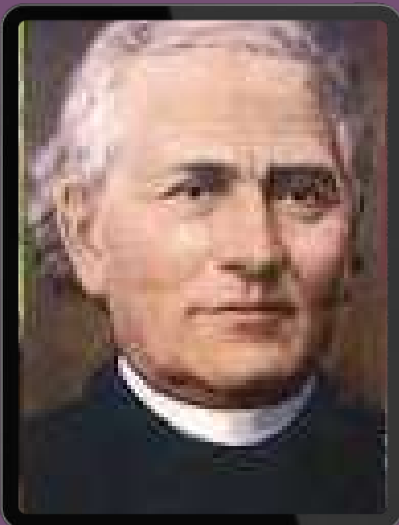

CHAPTER TWO - GOD CHOOSES THE POOR

Summary of #16.

God is merciful love, revealed in his plan to enter human history and free us from slavery, fear, sin, and death. With compassion, he comes close to human weakness, sharing in our poverty by becoming one of us—born as a child in a manger and enduring the humiliation of the cross.

In doing so, he embraces the full depth of human fragility, even death itself.

This understanding gives rise to the idea of God's "preferential option for the poor." This does not mean exclusion or favouritism, but highlights God's deep compassion for all who are vulnerable and oppressed.

Seeking to establish a kingdom of justice, fraternity, and solidarity, God holds a special concern for the disadvantaged and calls the Church to make a clear and committed choice to stand with the weakest.
